The Booth Bridge at Winchester, Oregon, is a major concrete span crossing the North Umpqua River. It was constructed in 1923-24 to improve travel on Highway 99, the principal thoroughfare between Oregon and California. The bridge served as a major route of travel for the next forty years. It is today in use but is adjacent to a wider and more heavily used bridge on Interstate Highway No. 5. This bridge has 7 major concrete arches. There are bronze markers mounted in small balconies on both the south and north ends of the bridge in honor of Robert Booth for whom the bridge was named.

Three Robert Booths of three generations of the same family have been prominent in Douglas County history. Rev. Robert Booth, born in Lancashire, England, on August 4, 1820, settled in Oregon in 1853. In August, 1867, he became Methodist minister at Wilbur. From 1870-72 he preached in eastern Oregon, but then returned to Douglas County. Robert A. Booth, was born in Yamhill County, Oregon, but was reared in Douglas County. He established the first store in Yoncalla and operated a sawmill there. Later a banker in Grants Pass, Robert A. Booth eventually became where he founded the Booth-Kelly Lumber Company. Robert Roy Booth, a son of Robert A. Booth, was reared in Grants Pass and Eugene. After working for his father's lumber company, he located in Douglas County in 1908 as a stock raiser in Scotts Valley.
